1. What is Open Government?

Open Government is a form of public governance that promotes maximum transparency and accountability, public participation, social collaboration and public integrity, leaving no one behind in the exercise of their democratic rights.

The goal of Open Government is to improve the quality of our democracy and strengthen people's trust in their public institutions.

The Spanish Constitution and laws recognise everyone's right to public information and participation. They also compel the Administration to abide by legislation and the law, acting objectively in serving the general interest and impartially in performing its public function. The values promoted by Open Government are therefore fully consistent with our constitutional order.

2. The Open Government Partnership

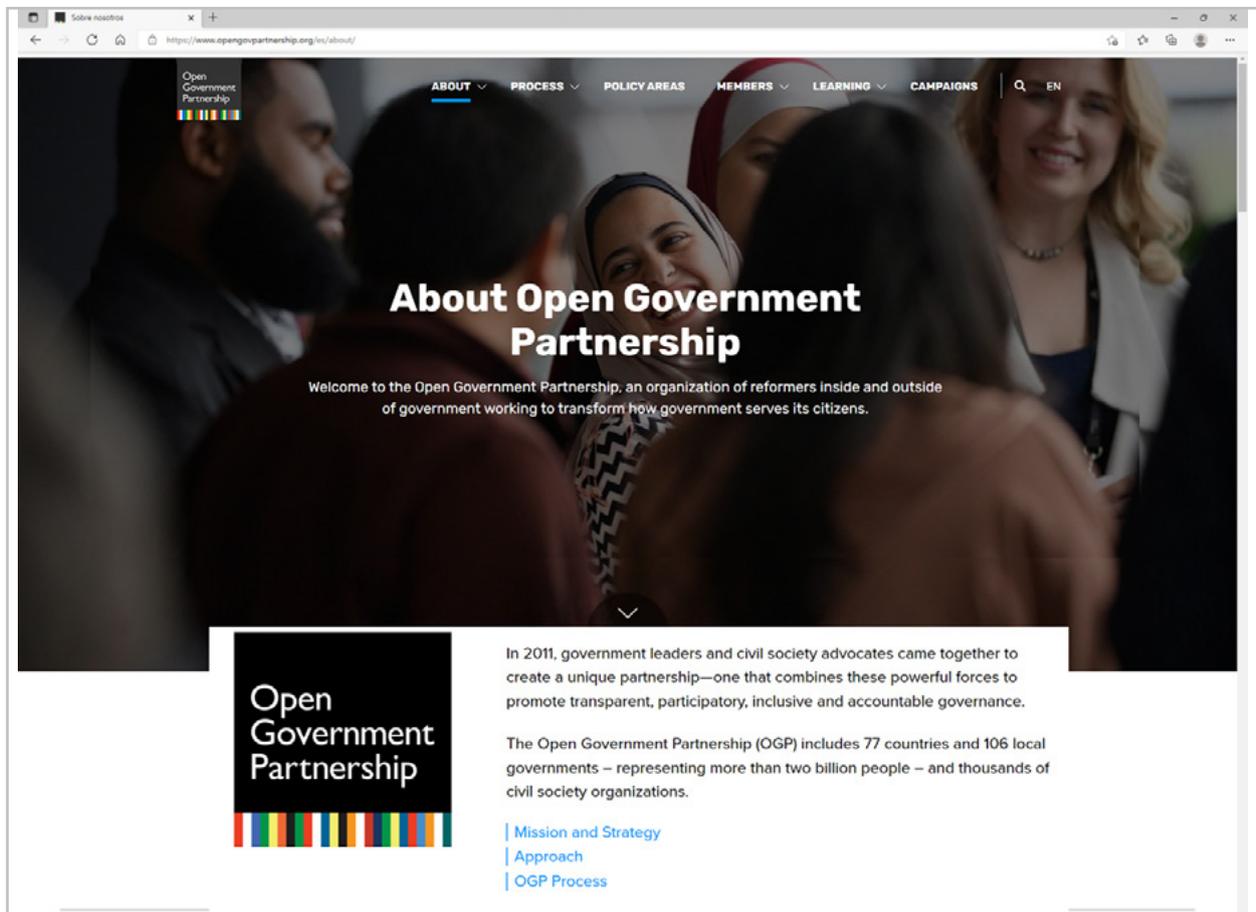
The Open Government Partnership (OGP) is an international partnership set up in 2011 to promote the transparency and accountability of governments and administrations, public participation in public affairs, collaboration, and public integrity around the world. Seventy-seven countries and a growing number of regional and local governments, representing more than two billion people, together with thousands of civil society organisations, are currently members of the Partnership.

Spain has been a member of the Open Government Partnership since it was founded, and was subsequently joined by the Regions of the Basque Country, Catalonia and Aragón, as well as Madrid City Council. All governments sign the Open Government Decla-

ration when joining the Partnership, undertaking to uphold the principles of open, transparent, participatory and accountable government.

To achieve this, they must develop Open Government Plans that include specific commitments, initiatives and actions to improve transparency, public participation, integrity and inclusiveness among their Administrations and public officials.

These Open Government Plans should be developed with public participation and the involvement of civil society organisations. Compliance with this plan is evaluated externally by the Partnership's Independent Review Mechanism, made up of international experts in Open Government.



3. Open Government in Spain

3.1. Open Government Plans

Since 2011, we have developed three Open Government Plans and are currently implementing the 4th Spanish Open Government Plan 2020-2024.

These Open Government plans have provided us with important advances in bringing the Administration closer to citizens and improving the quality of democracy.

The achievements we owe to the **1st Open Government Plan** (2012-2014) are as follows:

- We passed the law on Transparencia, Access to Information and Good Governance, in 2013. This law obliges public authorities to disclose certain information such as contracts, subsidies, plans, budgets, etc. It also recognises the right of access to public information. It allows people to ask the Administration whenever the information they are looking for cannot be found in the transparency portals.
- We published the accounts on the results of the Spanish Development Cooperation.
- We set up a system for collaboration and participation in public safety via social media.
- We improved and expanded crime statistics.
- We simplified patients' access to health information.

The **2nd Open Government Plan** (2014-2016) also brought improvements for citizens:

- We launched the State Administration's Transparency Portal; the Public Administrations have since been setting up their own transparency portals.
- We improved data access, exchange and protection on the Spanish Archives Portal (PARES), the main platform for the dissemination of historical documentary heritage in Spain.

- We provided free access to educational materials via the Procomún platform, while also promoting free online courses.
- We developed the National Online Health Data Bank.
- We expanded the Reuse of Public Sector Information (RISP by initial in spanish) system, which, apart from allowing new products, services and markets to be developed, improves transparency in the public administration.
- We improved and adapted the Justice Administration Portal.
- We consolidated the National Subsidy Reporting System.
- We set up the Spanish Drug Addictions Board with social representatives.

The **3rd Open Government Plan** (2017-2019) also introduced relevant improvements in these four areas:

In transparency and accountability:

- We removed the need to have a digital certificate or electronic signature to enjoy the right of access to public information.
- We increased the catalogue of published open data by more than 42%.
- We improved judicial statistics.
- The Ministry of Finance and Civil Services published new information services on budgets, performance and liquidation for all public administrations.
- We were able to improve the quality of real estate data by checking the cadastral register against the land registry.
- We introduced improvements in access to information and in disseminating information on violence against women. In addition to helping to raise social awareness, we have also made it easier for public and private agents to prevent and eradicate this social scourge and assist victims.

In the area of **improving participation**:

- We launched the Participation Observatory to evaluate the degree of public participation in various areas (drafting of laws and other regulations; development of public plans and programmes; advisory boards, electronic and social media), and developed recommendations to improve participation.
- The State Administration set up a participatory web space for Open Government on the Transparency Portal. Here, citizens and civil society can formulate their comments and proposals, and know the degree of compliance with the commitments of the Open Government plans in real time.
- We set up the Open Government Forum, the advantages of which are described below.

The following developments are notable in the **collaboration** area:

- We set up the Open Government Sectoral Commission: a permanent space for dialogue between our different administrations in order to pool initiatives developed on Open Government and its evolution.
- The Spanish Federation of Municipalities and Provinces (FEMP) promoted the Network of Local Entities for Transparency and Participation. It aims to promote innovation, improve the exchange of experiences, and ensure the ongoing improvement of the relationship between local governments and citizens, in accordance with the principles of Open Government.

Finally, the achievements of the 3rd Plan on **training and social awareness** were also relevant. These include:

- We developed and distributed the *Learning Guides on Open Government* with activities adapted to different educational levels, in order to foster the development of social and civic competencies in students.
- In 2018, all Public Administrations celebrated Open Gov Week to bring it closer to citizens and promote the exercise of the

rights of access to information and participation. Spain was the country that hosted most events worldwide in 2018. The same was true when we celebrated Open Government Week again in 2021 and 2022.

- We developed a wide range of courses for staff working for the Public Administrations, with a view to promoting a culture of Open Government.

In short, the Spanish Administration is meeting its commitments: 87% of the activities of the 3rd Plan were completed, which is more than 20 points higher than in the Partnership countries. This is stated in the Implementation Report of the 3rd Open Government Plan 2017-2019, which was prepared by the Independent Review Mechanism of the Open Government Partnership. This report indicates that 40% of the commitments of the 3rd Plan brought major advances in openness in our Administration, while only 19% of the commitments of the Partnership countries as a whole led to significant advances.



3.2. The Open Government Forum

One of the great advances that we owe to the 3rd Open Government Plan is the setting up of the **Open Government Forum** in 2018. This forum is a space for dialogue and collaboration, with a view to promoting transparency, participation and collaboration and to helping develop and evaluate Open Government Plans. This forum is made up of 64 representatives: 32 from Public Administrations (State, Regional and Local Entities), and 32 from civil society organisations.

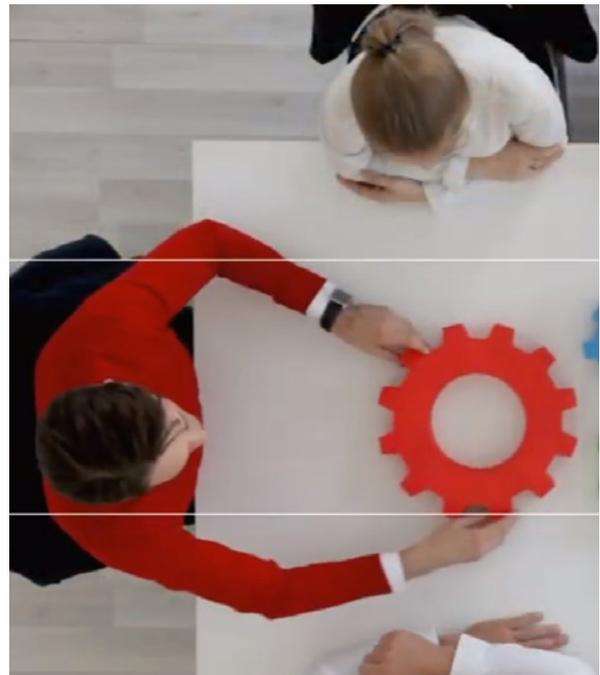
The Forum is chaired by the Secretary of State of the Civil Service, and meets at least once a year. The meetings may also be attended by individuals who can offer experience and advice.

The work is promoted via a Permanent Commission and five working groups, all of which are made up of the same number of representatives from public administrations and civil society.

In the working groups, those responsible for the commitments are accountable for the results.

There are currently five working groups:

1. Transparency and Accountability Group
2. Public Participation Group
3. Public Integrity Group
4. Training and Awareness Group
5. Communication and Collaboration Group



4. The 4th Spanish Open Government Plan 2020-2024

The Plenary of the Open Government Forum approved the 4th Spanish Open Government Plan 2020-2024 on 29th October 2020. The Plan includes 10 commitments, 112 initiatives and 543 activities. The following pages will detail the goals, how it was developed, and what its commitments and initiatives are.

4.1. General goals of the 4th Plan

The general goals set out in the 4th Plan are to:

1. Improve the transparency, open data and accountability of public administrations.
2. Promote, strengthen and improve the quality of participation of citizens in public management.
3. Strengthen the ethical values and integrity of public institutions.
4. Raise awareness about the values of Open Government among society and those working for the Administration.

In addition to these four goals, the 4th Plan also aims to:

- Help meet the Sustainable Development Goals set by the UN in the Agenda 2030. In particular, achieve Goal 16, which seeks to promote fair, peaceful societies in which everybody can take part without any obstacles.
- Promote social inclusion, equality and universal accessibility for people in situations of poverty or vulnerability, or at risk of social exclusion.

4.2. How the 4th Plan was prepared

The 4th Open Government Plan has been drawn up by and for everybody. It is the result of the direct participation of citizens, the contribution of civil society organisations, and the collaboration of all administrations. The following steps were taken to prepare and approve the Plan:

- The Forum approved the *Framework Document for the Development of the 4th Plan* on 14th February 2019. This document set out the general goals of the Plan; the characteristics required in the public participation process in order to know how to design it; and which criteria would be used to evaluate public initiatives and proposals.
- A communication campaign was carried out to encourage people to take part through the Transparency Portal and on Twitter (@transparencia_e and @060gobes).
- The Directorate General of Public Governance carried out an initial public consultation and received 130 proposals from citizens and civil society organisations.
- The *Co-creation Discussion Workshops* were organised in June and September 2020. At these meetings, the Administrations and civil society jointly decided on the priority public proposals that would become the commitments of the 4th Plan.
- Based on the conclusions of the discussion workshops, the Directorate General of Public Governance prepared the *Draft of the 4th Plan*, which was published on the Transparency Portal.
- After adding the input to the draft, a *New Public Consultation* was convened between September and October 2020. The Plenary Forum approved the 4th Governance Plan on 29th October 2020.

DESIGN OF THE FOURTH OPEN GOVERNMENT PLAN

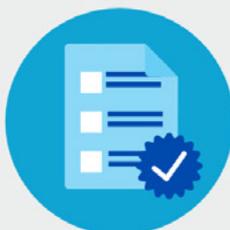
3. PRELIMINARY CONSULTATION

03/18 - 04/10/2019: **civil society organizations and citizens** in general make proposals for the Plan, through a form on the Transparency Portal.



5. DRAFT AND PUBLIC CONSULTATION:

The General Directorate of Public Governance prepares a draft and publishes it on the Transparency Portal so that **civil society organizations and citizens** can make **observations** (09/28 - 10/16/2020). Afterwards, the final draft is produced.

4.3. Characteristics of the 4th Plan

The 4th Open Government Plan includes the following new characteristics and improvements compared to previous plans:

- This Plan is for **four years (2020-2024)** instead of two. This extended duration allows us to take on more ambitious commitments, and ensures that there will be results with greater social impact.
- It is a **national Plan**, since it is the first time that all Spanish administrations have wanted to take part, and it reflects their firm commitment to policies of openness, transparency, participation and integrity in order to serve citizens more effectively. Spain is now a benchmark for other strongly decentralised or federally structured states.
- It is a **more ambitious** plan with a clear transformational impact, and includes 10 commitments and 113 initiatives to transform public management and strengthen the exercise of democratic rights.

- **It is a Plan by all people and for all people.** The 4th Plan is the result of public demands and the collaboration of the Public Administrations with civil society through the Open Government Forum.

4.4. Contents of the 4th Plan: commitments and initiatives

The 4th Spanish Open Government Plan 2020-2024 revolves around five pillars:

1. Transparency and accountability
2. Participation
3. Integrity
4. Awareness and Training
5. Regional and local initiatives (Federation of Municipalities and Provinces)

53 initiatives from the Regions, the Autonomous Cities (Ceuta and Melilla) and the Spanish Federation of Municipalities and Provinces have been included.

The Plan includes 10 commitments and 113 initiatives.

1.1.1. Pillar 1. Initiatives to extend transparency and accountability

- > **Commitment 1.** *Reform of the regulatory framework for transparency.* This commitment includes three initiatives:
 - Pass the Regulation for developing Act 19/2013 on transparency, access to public information and good governance.
 - Spain’s ratification of the Council of Europe Convention on Access to Public Documents.
 - Reform of the law on Transparency, Access to Public Information and Good Governance bringing it in line with the national and international context.

Thanks to these initiatives, public administrations will be more transparent and people will be able to access public information more easily.

- > **Commitment 2.** *Transparency and accountability improvement and reinforcement plan.* The initiatives that will make it possible to meet this commitment are as follows:
 - Implement a system to evaluate and accredit the transparency of public and private organisations subject to the law on transparency. This is a project of the Council of Transparency and Good Governance and the Transparency Counselors of the Regions.



- Improve the Transparency Portal, expanding the available information and accountability in terms of fulfilling the public plans.
- Promote open data and public information through the transposition of European Directive 2019/1024 on open data and the reuse of public sector information.
- Finally, this commitment also includes **good practices in sectoral areas**, so people have more information on public contracts, subsidies and budgets, along with their priorities and the management of local entities. Access to data from the Commercial Registry will also be provided.

1.1.2. Pillar 2. Initiatives to promote public participation

> **Commitment 3. Participation Improvement Plan.** The 4th Plan includes five initiatives to promote, strengthen and improve the participation of all people in public affairs:

- Create a Participation Platform on the Transparency Portal website for public consultation.
- Improve operation of the Open Government Forum.
- Evaluate and improve public participation in public plans and programmes, in consultative bodies, and through electronic and social media.

- Implement Innovation Laboratories for public participation, incorporating the opinion and knowledge of citizens in the management of public affairs.
- Generate a culture conducive to participation among public employees through training actions.

> **Commitment 4. Normative footprint.**

- This system will make it possible for any person to learn about the process of drafting regulations, from the very beginning through to their approval: documentation, procedures, versions, changes and approval. The aim is to encourage public participation in drafting regulations.

1.1.3. Pillar 3: Initiatives to ensure public integrity

> **Commitment 5. Public integrity systems.**

- **Diagnose and improve prevention systems.** First of all, the prevention systems already in place in the Administration will be evaluated in order to improve and reinforce them: risk mapping, codes of conduct, surveys, quality systems, and improved training.
- **Regulation of a obligatory registry of lobbies.** This initiative will increase transparency, as citizens will be able to know to what extent stakeholders are involved in public decision-making. These groups will have a code of conduct for their representatives in order to prevent possible conflicts of interest.
- **Amendment of the law on Incompatibilities Public Administrations Staff.** This initiative will establish a new system for preventing conflicts of interest that is more complete and in line with the current Administration in the field of public employment.



- **Bolster integrity in specific areas: Artificial intelligence.** This initiative aims to bolster ethical values and mechanisms in order to strengthen the integrity of public institutions and reinforce public confidence in the use of data and Artificial Intelligence.
- > **Commitment 6. Whistleblower protection.**
- This initiative consists of adopting a new legal framework to ensure the protection of individuals who provide information on wrongdoing within an organisation, whether public or private. It will be achieved by transposing European Directive 2019/1937 on the protection of persons reporting breaches of EU law into Spanish law.

1.1.4. Pillar 4: Awareness and training initiatives

- > **Commitment 7. Education and training in Open Government.**
 - **Education for citizenship and for experts.** The Centre for Political and Constitutional Studies will provide free online training on Open Government for citizens and experts.
 - **Training and accreditation of the skills of women in the rural areas, reducing the digital divide.** With the aim of improving, bolstering and consolidating the

professional digital skills of women in the countryside.

- **Draw up a Guide on Open Government.** This will disseminate its basic principles not only among citizens, but also to professional sectors related to open government and its principles.
- **Open Government training for public employees.** The fundamental goal is to reinforce attitudes around transparency, accountability, participation and collaboration.

> **Commitment 8.** *Inclusive communication about Open Government.* In order to ensure that the values of open government are known by all people and that they can exercise their rights to public information and participation under equal conditions and without leaving anyone behind; this Commitment takes shape through the following initiatives:

- **Inclusive Communication Plan on Open Government** to make society aware of the values and progress of Open Government, and ensure they are aware of and use the Transparency portal.
- **International Promotion of the Open Government.** A series of participation and collaboration actions has been planned with international organisations in order to promote and disseminate Open Government.
- **Cutting-edge research and advanced debate** on Open Government. The aim is to promote research and innovation in this area in the academic and scientific community.
- **Disseminate scientific production.** The aim is to encourage debate among experts and disseminate scientific production on topics ranging from analysis and development of new policies, through to the

challenges of transparency and the use of algorithms by public authorities, among other areas of interest.

> **Commitment 9.** *Observatory of Open Government.*

The purpose of this Observatory is to publicise and recognise initiatives on transparency, integrity and participation, as well as good practices already in place in the Ministries and other public or social organisations.

The Observatory includes 26 best practices to be developed by nine ministerial departments:

1. Ministry of the Presidency, Relations with Parliament, and Democratic Memory.
2. Health.
3. Industry, Commerce and Tourism.
4. Economic Affairs and Digital Transformation.
5. Transportation, Mobility, and Urban Agenda.
6. Ecological Transition and the Demographic Challenge.
7. Science and Innovation.
8. Universities.
9. Social Rights and Agenda 2030.

A further two good practices of social organisations are also included.





1.1.5. Commitments of the Autonomous Regions and Cities and of the Federation of Municipalities and Provinces

- > **Commitment 10.** *Open government initiatives of the autonomous regions and cities and the FEMP.* Commitment 10 in the 4th Plan includes 53 initiatives that are the responsibility of all the Regions, the Autonomous Cities of Ceuta and Melilla, and the Federation of Municipalities and Provinces.

These initiatives follow the same general goals of the 4th Plan: to promote transparency and accountability, public participation, public integrity, and training and awareness among public employees and the general public.
